

The Baltic Sea Region is a hub of international trade, energy flows, industrial links, and cultural exchange. At a time when major war has returned to Europe, it is also a potential theater of confrontation with Russia. The countries of NATO's Northeast in the Baltic Sea Region—the Nordics, the Baltics, Poland, and Germany—have long been linked through a web of close political, security, and defense cooperation formats. Russia's war against Ukraine has united them against the shared threat. As Europe grapples with the end of the post-Cold War order, transatlantic allies must think anew about what role Northeastern Europe will play in Europe's security and defense architecture. With Finland and Sweden joining NATO, Denmark removing its opt-out from the European Union's Common Security and Defense Policy, and NATO and the EU poised to ramp up cooperation, now is the time to forge a truly joint regional approach to security and defense challenges—not least because the United States is asking Europeans to take responsibility for their own security. European stability, peace, and prosperity are at stake in the Baltic Sea Region. The potential for innovation and cooperation is substantial.

Session 1: Ukraine's future

Wednesday, November 13, 9:15 to 10:45 CET

Nearly three years have passed since Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine. Russia continues to make incremental gains in Ukrainian territory, but events like Ukraine's Kursk offensive prove that there is still room for surprise. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky has presented his "victory plan" to Western capitals. Simultaneously, policymakers in these same capitals are divided on crucial questions, from whether to lift restrictions on Ukraine's ability to use long-range weapons to how to integrate Ukraine in Europe's security architecture. Uncertainty over the future of U.S. leadership in Europe has accelerated European debates about the role and responsibility of Europe vis-à-vis Ukraine and Europe's ability to step up as primary security provider. In the aftermath of the U.S. elections, an open and frank exchange with Washington about the future of European and Ukrainian security is crucial. The countries of the Baltic Sea Region are instrumental in the process of proactively shaping the European offer.

How would various elements of a potential plan to end the war, including security guarantees to Ukraine or Ukrainian membership in NATO or the EU, affect security and defense in NATO's Northeast? What risks—past, present, and future—are Baltic Sea Region countries particularly concerned with? What do the government in Kyiv and the new U.S. administration expect from the countries of the region when it comes to securing Ukraine's future and can they deliver?

Session 2: The politics of support for Ukraine

Wednesday, November 13, 11:15 to 12:45 CET

In both the United States and across Europe, support for Ukraine has become an increasingly delicate point of contention, particularly as the war enters its third year. Those in favor of continuing—or increasing—military and economic support for Ukraine are facing growing backlash by a range of opponents, from individuals uncertain or concerned about the war’s endgame to Kremlin-sympathizers. In some countries, a narrative of “peace” that stands in conflict with further military support for Kyiv is gaining momentum among the electorate, causing even pro-Ukrainian politicians to soften or alter their positions. In the United States, future aid packages to Ukraine are a politically contested topic. Disinformation surrounding support for Ukraine also remains a prevalent challenge on both sides of the Atlantic.

What is the state of public support for military aid toward Ukraine across the Baltic Sea Region and in Baltic Sea Region security guarantor states like the United States and United Kingdom? How is this dynamic affecting the level of support offered to Ukraine? How should governments respond to the fears and grievances that fuel the backlash? What can they learn from each other about how to respond to the “peace” narrative which calls for an immediate stop of military support? What best practices exist in combatting disinformation?
